- Each travel award is worth \$750
- You must submit an abstract for the annual meeting to be eligible for a travel award
- The deadline for abstracts is October 15.
- The deadline for travel award applications is December 20.

■ Beatrice Medicine Travel Awards

Two travel awards for Native American students in honor of the prominent anthropologist, Dr. Beatrice Medicine.

■ Edward H. and Rosamond B. Spicer Travel Awards

Two awards commemorate Edward H. and Rosamond B. Spicer's devotion to the study of community and to students in the social sciences. Papers should be based on *community*, broadly conceived.

■ Del Jones Memorial Travel Awards

Prof. Del Jones was a distinguished African American anthropologist whose work transformed the lives of disadvantaged peoples. Two travel grants are awarded for papers that will best reflect the contributions and/or life experiences of Del Jones.

■ Gil Kushner Travel Award

The award honors the groundbreaking work of Prof. Gil Kushner, in establishing applied anthropology as a graduate discipline. To be eligible, a student must prepare a brief statement on the persistence of culture.

■ Human Rights Defender Travel Award

To be eligible a student must prepare a brief statement which describes his/her interest in human rights. The Award seeks to promote an interest in the conjunction of the applied social sciences and human rights issues.

■ Involuntary Resettlement Travel Award

A travel grant for students in Anthropology and related social sciences interested in researching and writing about development-caused population displacement and involuntary resettlement.

■ John Bodley Travel Award

A travel grant honoring Prof. John Bodley's commitment to a generation of graduate students in Anthropology at Washington State University.

■ Student Endowed Travel Award

The applicant must submit a Student Information Sheet, CV, and a brief essay on "How applied theories and methods influenced your research or career goals, and how participation in the SfAA might help you to achieve these goals?"

Erve Chambers Tourism and Heritage Paper Award

Papers should entail original research on the themes of *tourism* and/or *heritage* broadly defined. Top papers will be selected for inclusion in a featured paper session at the SfAA Annual Meeting, and the top three papers will receive cash awards - \$300 for first prize, and \$150 each for two honorable mentions.

Students are invited to submit posters on the theme of tourism for a special competition honoring long-time member, Valene Smith. Three cash prizes are awarded - \$500 for 1st place, and two honorable mentions of \$250. In order to qualify, the posters should be concerned in some way with the applied social science of tourism.

Student Poster Prizes

SfAA also sponsors an open student poster competition. Award amounts are \$300 for 1st place, \$200 for 2nd place, and \$100 for 3rd place.

Peter K. New Award

Annual student research competition honoring the late Peter Kong-ming New, a distinguished medical sociologist-anthropologist. The award is given to the best paper on an applied research project in the social/behavioral sciences. The research should be in the domain of health care or human services (broadly construed). The 1st place winner receives a cash prize of \$3,000 and a crystal trophy, 2nd place \$1,500, and 3rd place \$750. All winners receive \$350 in travel funds and two nights lodging to attend the SfAA annual meeting.
